STATE PLAN QUICK NOTES

- 1. State plans due August 15, 2001 are for five year and cover the time period October 1, 2001 September 30, 2006.
- 2. Not less than 60% of Council membership must be representatives of individuals with developmental disabilities. Councils are asked to include a plan for compliance in their State Plan if they cannot meet the membership requirements by August 15, 2001.
- 3. Councils must have public input into development of state plan.
- 4. The Comprehensive Review and Analysis must include information on waiting lists, adequacy of current and future resources, and ICF(MR)s and HCBW, and rehabilitation technology.
- 5. Councils must now have a goal to establish or strengthen a program to fund a self-advocacy group, provide leadership training opportunities to individuals with developmental disabilities, and support individuals with developmental disabilities in leadership positions.
- 6. Not less than 70% of Councils funds are for activities related to goals.
- 7. The State plan must assure that Councils will participate in the planning, design or redesign and monitoring of State quality assurance systems that affect individuals with developmental disabilities.
- 8. Consumer satisfaction of Council supported or conducted activities will be reported on in the Program Performance Report (PPR) beginning in FY2002.
- 9. PPRs for FY2001 will be the same format as last year (FY2000). New PPR formats will be used beginning in FY2002.
- 10. There are nine Areas of Emphasis. They are: Employment (EM), Education and Early Intervention ED), Housing (HO), Health (HE), Child Care (CH), Recreation (RE), Transportation (TR), Quality Assurance (QA), and Formal/Informal Community Supports (CS). The Areas of Emphasis replace the Federal Priority Areas and Life Domain Areas.

STATE PLAN FORMAT: SECTION NOTES & GUIDELINES

SECTION I: COUNCIL IDENTIFICATION

Changes in format

A line has been added for Contact Person and a Phone Number for that person.

The line for Council chairperson appointment date is eliminated because that information is in the membership chart.

The Council Membership and Staff information is now in a chart format. This should simplify input of the information and make printing less bulky.

Corresponding changes in the Act

Not less than 60% of the membership must be representatives of individuals with developmental disabilities.

Higher education representative is no longer required.

Representation from Title V of Social Security Act is now required.

Please provide a plan for compliance if the Council cannot fulfill the new requirements of the Act by the August 15, 2001 due date of the State Plan. Councils are expected to be in compliance by the next plan update - August 15, 2002.

SECTION II: DESIGNATED STATE AGENCY

There are no substantial changes in this section.

SECTION III: COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW AND ANALYSIS

There are two new parts in this section, Part D - Comprehensive Review and Analysis - and Part E - Waiting Lists. Part G - Rationale for Goal Selection replaces Section IV - Selection of Priorities

1. Part D. Community Services and Opportunities - "Provide a summary of the extent to which community services and opportunities related to the areas of emphasis directly benefit individuals with developmental disabilities. Include information on assistive technology/services and rehabilitation technology, current resources and projected availability of future resources to fund services, and health care and other supports and services received in ICF(MR)s and through Home and Community Based Waivers."

(Note - you may already have provided this information in another area of this SECTION III. If so, it is not necessary to repeat.)

Discussion

The ICF(MR) and HCBW information requested provides Councils an opportunity to evaluate those services in your state. Many Councils have been involved with states efforts to reduce the numbers of people living in large, congregate residences and in turn developing the capacity of the community to provide the necessary supports and services. While the P&As focus on protecting the rights of the individual, Councils, as indirect service entities, are well suited to analyzing and acting on data trends for policy purposes. Given that there are 6,700 ICF(MRs) nationwide, Council monitoring of each and every one would be time intensive and

duplicative of current monitoring efforts. The monitoring of each ICF(MR) is less the issue for Councils than the service system makeup and the balance of resources among various types of services and supports.

Resources

What is available to Councils to provide them the necessary information they need to review the ICF(MR) and home and community based waiver systems?

ICF(MR)

Each ICF(MR) is surveyed and reviewed annually by HCFA through a Form 2567. There are eight "conditions of participation" that are evaluated to determine whether or not an ICF(MR) will retain certification. Those eight conditions are:

Client protection

Active treatment

Client behaviors and Facility practices

Health care services

Physical environment

Governing body

Facilities staffing

Behavior management

One stage of the Form 2567 is called a Fundamental survey which looks at the first four areas – client protection, active treatment, client behaviors and facility practices, and health care services. These areas focus on outcomes for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Home and Community Based Waivers

- Annually, states with waiver programs submit Form 372 which includes the number of
 individuals served under the waiver, the services received, and the dollar amounts of
 services. In addition to the waiver services the form provides information on other services
 and on the health and welfare of individuals being served.
- State waiver programs are reviewed prior to expiration. A report is generated by the regional office of HCFA indicating overall findings of the waiver program.
- States submit an application when applying for waiver. This application contains information relative to the state waiver services.

Councils will need to receive the reports of the ICF(MR)s and HCBW in their state and analyze them for trend information. A Council's analysis might lead to policy recommendations to improve the services and supports to individuals with developmental disabilities who live in ICF(MR)s and who receive services through HCBW.

Please remember that Councils are to provide summary information.

2. Part E - Waiting lists - Please report the numbers of individuals with developmental disabilities on waiting lists for services

Discussion

Although many states maintain "waiting lists" there are no national standards for information to include in the lists, or for who maintains the list, or how it is generated. Some states maintain lists by services needed, some by disability type, some by number of services requested. States may maintain their lists by agency, some are maintained by the University Center, and in one case maintained by the Council.

State Plan Reporting

The DD Act of 2000 requires Councils to report on "the number of individuals with developmental disabilities on waiting lists for services." In the State Plan, Councils will simply report the list(s) name and numbers and provide a brief analysis. If a state does not have a waiting list there would be no number to report. However, this does not necessarily mean that all individuals with developmental disabilities are getting the services they need. Also, there may be issues of eligibility and community capacity that Councils currently analyze in their State Plans. Raising these issues relative to waiting lists is a responsibility of the Councils that demonstrates their unique role of examiner and evaluator of the service delivery system.

For states that maintain them, waiting lists are a component of the service delivery system. If a waiting list is sufficiently broken down to give the number of individuals with developmental disabilities needing services that number would reported. If the list does not provide a breakdown by disability group then the whole number would be reported. A Council's discussion of the waiting list would include the numbers as well as what the numbers mean and don't mean.

In describing the makeup of the list consider the following questions:

Does the waiting list reflect all people with developmental disabilities who need services? Are there eligibility issues with the waiting list?
What services does the waiting list(s) include?
Does the waiting list tell us anything about aging caregivers?
Is there a priority ranking within the waiting list?
Does our state have a waiting list initiative?
If yes, is the Council involved with the initiative?
Have dollars been leveraged to reduce the waiting list?

The Waiting List information reported in the State Plan and PPR is intended for information purposes relative to the reporting mandate in the Act. It is not required that Councils have a goal, objective or outcome measure relative to the waiting list. Waiting List Outcome measures have been removed from the Areas of Emphasis. If Councils do have a goal relative to a waiting list it is recommended that it be reported in the 'other' category of the corresponding Area of Emphasis. For instance, a Section 8 Housing list initiative would be reported in Housing. If a wait list goal is more generic it would be reported in the Cross Cutting area.

3. **Part G - Rationale for Goal Selection -** "Provide a rationale for goals related to advocacy, capacity building, and systemic change to be undertaken by the Council."

Part G replaces Section IV - Selection of Priorities

A 10,000 character space is now available to present the rationale. Previously, the section was broken down into priority areas and domains. The new Part G is consistent with the language of the Act.

SECTION IV: AREAS OF EMPHASIS AND PERFORMANCE TARGETS

Strategies

The DD Act of 2000 now requires the State Plan to include "strategies to be used in achieving each goal." State Council strategies are defined in the Act and are included with each goal in a checklist style in the State Plan format. These strategies are:

Areas of Emphasis

The Areas of Emphasis have replaced the Life Domain Areas and Federal Priority Areas. They Areas of Emphasis are as follows:

Employment (EM)

Education and Early Intervention (ED)

Housing (HO)

Health (HE)

Child Care (CH)

Recreation (RE)

Transportation (TR)

Quality Assurance (QA)

Formal/Informal Community Supports (CS)

Cross Cutting (CC)

Discussion and State Plan Reporting

The Outcome Measures in the areas of Employment, Education and Early Intervention, Housing and Health are the same as before. New Outcome Measures have been developed for the new Areas of Emphasis. Self-determination and Community Inclusion are no longer separate areas.

Most Self-determination activities should be reported in the Quality Assurance area where leadership training, self-advocacy and self-determination are specifically defined as quality assurance activities.

The majority of the goals and objectives in the Community Inclusion category included transportation, recreation, faith communities, accommodations, public awareness and educating policymakers, quality assurance, child care, self-advocacy, personal assistance services, and aging. Transportation, recreation, quality assurance, and child care are now individual Areas of Emphasis. Any goals, objectives, outcome measures, etc. related to these areas that were previously reported in Community Inclusion (or reported in any other Life Domain area) would be transferred to the appropriate new Area of Emphasis. Also, some goals and objectives that were reported in Community Inclusion in previous State Plans should be reported in more appropriate Areas of Emphasis. For example, the following goals were included in Community Inclusion: "more children in inclusive classrooms" (should be in Education), "increase available housing" (should be in Housing), and "increase community health care services" (should be in Health).

Other items reported in Community Inclusion, for instance personal assistance services, faith communities, and accommodations, would now be reported in the new Formal and Informal Community Supports Area of Emphasis.

Interagency coordination and systems integration

The definition of Quality Assurance Activities includes "activities related to interagency coordination and systems integration that result in improved and enhanced services, supports, and other assistance that contribute to and protect the self-determination, independence, productivity, and integration and inclusion in all facets of community life, of individuals with developmental disabilities." Interagency coordination and collaboration are important fundamental Council activities. In order to reflect this the following outcome measure is added:

QA10 Number of entities participating in partnerships or coalitions created or sustained as a result of Council efforts

Cross Cutting

The Cross Cutting area now has space for goals and objectives that specifically address the outcome measures in this area.

SECTION V: ASSURANCES

A copy of the assurances, taken from the law, is enclosed. Please note there are some changes as follows:

- 1. not less than 70% of funds will be expended for activities related to the goals (previously 65%)
- 2. not more than 20% of such funds will be allocated to the designated state agency for service demonstrations by such agency (previously 25%)
- 3. under PROGRAM ACCESSIBILITY STANDARDS new language specifically addresses meeting accessibility requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act, and the Fair Housing Act.
- 4. STATE QUALITY ASSURANCE The plan shall provide assurances that the Council will participate in the planning, design or redesign, and monitoring of State quality assurance systems that affect individuals with developmental disabilities.

SECTION VI: PROJECTED COUNCIL BUDGET

The State Plan budget has been changed to be consistent with the PPR budget format and with the DD Act in terms of the new Areas of Emphasis.

SECTION VII: PUBLIC INPUT AND REVIEW

"The plan shall be based on public input. The Council shall make the plan available for public review and comment, after providing appropriate and sufficient notice in accessible formats of the opportunity for such review and comment. The Council shall revise the plan to take into account and respond to significant comments."

Previously the plan had to be made available for public review and comment. Councils must now get public input into the development of the plan. If your Five-Year State Plan includes goals and objectives that have not been through a public input process please develop and discuss a plan/timeline for ensuring public input into the plan, including how you will take into account and respond to significant comments. For the future, public input must be solicited before making significant changes to the Plan.

STATE PLAN ASSURANCES

Councils are required to submit to their Regional offices a hard copy of the assurances along with a signature sheet (see page 41 of Five Year State Plan format).

- (A) IN GENERAL.--The plan shall contain or be supported by assurances and information described in subparagraphs (B) through (N) that are satisfactory to the Secretary.
- (B) USE OF FUNDS --With respect to the funds paid to the State under section 122, the plan shall provide assurances that--
- (i) not less than 70 percent of such funds will be expended for activities related to the goals described in paragraph (4);
- (ii) such funds will contribute to the achievement of the purpose of this subtitle in various political subdivisions of the State;
- (iii) such funds will be used to supplement, and not supplant, the non-Federal funds that would otherwise be made available for the purposes for which the funds paid under section 122 are provided;
- (iv) such funds will be used to complement and augment rather than duplicate or replace services for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families who are eligible for Federal assistance under other State programs;
- (v) part of such funds will be made available by the State to public or private entities:
- (vi) at the request of any State, a portion of such funds provided to such State under this subtitle for any fiscal year shall be available to pay up to \1/2\ (or the entire amount if the Council is the designated State agency) of the expenditures found to be necessary by the Secretary for the proper and efficient exercise of the functions of the designated State agency, except that not more than 5 percent of such funds provided to such State for any fiscal year, or \$50,000, whichever is less, shall be made available for total expenditures for such purpose by the designated State agency; and
- (vii) not more than 20 percent of such funds will be allocated to the designated State agency for service demonstrations by such agency that--
 - (I) contribute to the achievement of the purpose of this subtitle; and
 - (II) are explicitly authorized by the Council.
- (C) STATE FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION -- The plan shall provide assurances that there will be reasonable State financial participation in the cost of carrying out the plan.
- (D) CONFLICT OF INTEREST -- The plan shall provide an assurance that no member of such Council will cast a vote on any matter that would provide direct financial benefit to the member or otherwise give the appearance of a conflict of interest.

- (E) URBAN AND RURAL POVERTY AREAS -- The plan shall provide assurances that special financial and technical assistance will be given to organizations that provide community services, individualized supports, and other forms of assistance to individuals with developmental disabilities who live in areas designated as urban or rural poverty areas.
- (F) PROGRAM ACCESSIBILITY STANDARDS --The plan shall provide assurances that programs, projects, and activities funded under the plan, and the buildings in which such programs, projects, and activities are operated, will meet standards prescribed by the Secretary in regulations and all applicable Federal and State accessibility standards, including accessibility requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794d), and the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601 et seq.).
- (G) INDIVIDUALIZED SERVICES -- The plan shall provide assurances that any direct services provided to individuals with developmental disabilities and funded under the plan will be provided in an individualized manner, consistent with the unique strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, and capabilities of such individual.
- (H) HUMAN RIGHTS --The plan shall provide assurances that the human rights of the individuals with developmental disabilities (especially individuals without familial protection) who are receiving services under programs assisted under this subtitle will be protected consistent with section 109 (relating to rights of individuals with developmental disabilities).
- (I) MINORITY PARTICIPATION -- The plan shall provide assurances that the State has taken affirmative steps to assure that participation in programs funded under this subtitle is geographically representative of the State, and reflects the diversity of the State with respect to race and ethnicity.
- (J) EMPLOYEE PROTECTIONS -- The plan shall provide assurances that fair and equitable arrangements (as determined by the Secretary after consultation with the Secretary of Labor) will be provided to protect the interests of employees affected by actions taken under the plan to provide community living activities, including arrangements designed to preserve employee rights and benefits and provide training and retraining of such employees where necessary, and arrangements under which maximum efforts will be made to guarantee the employment of such employees.
- (K) STAFF ASSIGNMENTS —The plan shall provide assurances that the staff and other personnel of the Council, while working for the Council, will be responsible solely for assisting the Council in carrying out the duties of the Council under this subtitle and will not be assigned duties by the designated State agency, or any other agency, office, or entity of the State.

- (L) NONINTERFERENCE --The plan shall provide assurances that the designated State agency, and any other agency, office, or entity of the State, will not interfere with the advocacy, capacity building, and systemic change activities, budget, personnel, State plan development, or plan implementation of the Council, except that the designated State agency shall have the authority necessary to carry out the responsibilities described in section 125(d)(3).
- (M) STATE QUALITY ASSURANCE -- The plan shall provide assurances that the Council will participate in the planning, design or redesign, and monitoring of State quality assurance systems that affect individuals with developmental disabilities.
- (N) OTHER ASSURANCES -- The plan shall contain such additional information and assurances as the Secretary may find necessary to carry out the provisions (including the purpose) of this subtitle.

SELF-ADVOCACY

Definition

Self-advocacy organization - An organization whose members are primarily individuals with developmental disabilities, and whose leaders are individuals with developmental disabilities. The organization may or may not receive support from individuals without developmental disabilities, however, organizational decisions are made by the leaders and by members with developmental disabilities.

Councils must include in the State Plan:

- ... a goal, for each year of the grant, to-
 - 1. establish or strengthen a program for the direct funding of a State self-advocacy organization led by individuals with developmental disabilities;
 - 2. support opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities who are considered leaders to provide leadership training to individuals with developmental disabilities who may become leaders; and
 - 3. support and expand participation of individuals with developmental disabilities in cross-disability and culturally diverse leadership coalition

(Councils must have a goal addressing all three areas.)

Compliance with this goal:

Part 1

- The Council directly funds a self-advocacy organization in the state to establish or strengthen the program
- The Council contributes to a program that directly funds a self-advocacy organization in the state

Contributes means provides funding, TA, or other support that establishes or strengthens the program. For instance, the State MR program provides funding to a self-advocacy organization. The Council contributes toward that funding.

 The Council provides TA to establish the direct funding of a self-advocacy organization in the state

Example – Council helps a self-advocacy organization **successfully** acquire other direct funding resources (grants, foundations, public funds, etc.)

Part 2

Some examples might include Partners in Policymaking or Legislative advocacy training that results in training other individuals

Part 3

Council support could include financial support, mentoring, assistance in finding opportunities on coalitions, boards, etc., and assistance at meetings.

Although the DD Act of 2000 asks only for "consumer satisfaction with Council supported or conducted activities," it has been recommended that we get expert help to develop a more comprehensive survey process that meets other need of the Councils. ADD is considering developing a survey packet with three components:

- 1. What Councils must do to be in compliance with the Act
- 2. The impact of councils in their state
- 3. Internal evaluations

This will help to meet the needs of Councils that are interested in pursuing satisfaction pass the basic requirements of the law.
