My dear	
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I beg to acknowledge you letter in regard to ______. I am sorry that I cannot be more hopeful in regard to her future, but she is one of the unusual types of glandular deficiency that does not respond well to treatment. We are able to give her only very minute doses of thyroid as she becomes very excitable and it does not agree with her. Her health is at present quite good, but there are times when she loses weight and seems rather weak and ill without apparent cause. I think she is far more quiet and easier to manage than when she was admitted. She will now sit with other children at the table and class work and attempt to do some of the simple things.

I think you take the right viewpoint in regard to her. She is happy in her own way and does not in any way realize what she is missing, and that it is difficult for you.
