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#### PREFACE

This paper is one of • series prepared under HEW, Office of Human Development, Grant of National Significance 54-P-71210/Z-01. on pertinent issues on planning, administration, monitoring and evaluation in the developmental disabilities formula grant program (DDRGP) of Public law 94-103.

Issues to be addressed in the series are:

- Prevalence of the Developmental Disabilities
- Rates of Prevalence of the Developmental Disabilities
- · Characteristics of the Developmentally Disabled
- Developmentally Disabled Population Service Needs
- Approaches to Developmental Disabilities Service Needs Assessment

- Characteristics of Developmental Disabilities State Planning Councils
- Caps and Barriers in the Developmental Disabilities Service Network
- Goals and Objectives of the Developmental Disabilities Program
- Designs for Implementation

The analysis presented in each of the issue papers is based on information in Fiscal Year 1978 developmental disabilities state plans. As a result, what is presented in each paper is defined, to varying degrees, by the data recorded in the state plans. The nature and effect of limitations on specific analyses due to source data problems are described in each paper.

The preparation of developmental disabilities state plans for Fiscal Year 1978 was a moumental effort nation-vide as well as at all jurisdictional levels. The state plans themselves attest to the diligence and care of the investment: over 75% of the 54 state plans contain 50 or more of the information requested in the State Plan Guidelines and over 30% of the plans provide 70% or more of the information.

In the Developmental Disabilities Program the "who" is equal in importance to the achievements themselves. Many national, regional and state constituents of the program have contributed to the overall excellence of the developmental disabilities state plans by their direct support, assistance and spirited debate of planning issues. Frankly, it would be difficult to acclaim each of the over 150 persons at national, regional, and state levels who were instrumental in development of the state plans.

It should be recognized that state level planners and council members who participated in developmental disabilities state plan development have gathered a substantial information base for the Developmental Disabilities Program. In many instances situational and resource difficulties had to be overcome by the councils to produce this meaningful and important document in their states. The Developmental Disabilities Program councils and staff are the principal contributors to the content of these papers.

The staff of each regional developmental disabilities office has contributed guidance as well as many hours of assistance to both the states and DCI technical assistance staff. Regional officers of the Developmental Disabilities Program shared in the primary development of the developmental disabilities state plans.

At the national level there has been continued direction, awareness of the importance of the comprehensive planning mandate and support for the operational effort to enhance state and regional offices, capability to implement the planning guidelines. The Developmental Disabilities Office Director, executive staff and those in the Program Operations and Research and Evaluation Divisions were key contributors to the momentum of the Fiscal Year 1978 developmental disabilities state plan development effort.

Final compilation and analysis of the information in developmental disabilities state plans is the result of effort by the EMC Institute staff. Data compilation and paper development were conducted by:

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#### APPROACHES TO DD SERVICE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

This document contains the rationales and sources for DD service needs estimates used by forty-three (43) FY 1978 DD state plans. This information is intended to be used as a resource by state DD councils in assessing the service needs of the DD population.

The material in this document was collected to facilitate an analysis of trends in state DD council perceptions of service need.\* The results of that analysis are presented in a separate issue paper in this series, "Service Needs of the Developmentally Disabled".

Formulas, sources, and justifications for services needs are given here by state for both Direct Services (Table 1) and Support Services (Table 2). The basis for service needs most frequently used by the states include: consultations with professionals in the field of developmental disabilities; review of other states' assessment techniques; and review of agency service records or other literature. Only six states conducted a survey of the service needs of the developmentally disabled.

#### USES OF THE DATA

This document can be used in the following ways:

- 1. To facilitate state Developmental Disabilities council decisions about the service needs of the Developmentally Disabled population. Provision of the rationale for estimates of needs for each type of service used by each state allows council decision—makers to weigh the suitability of each needs assumption for their state's purposes.
- 2. To provide additional documentation to support prior estimates of Developmental Disabilities service needs.
- 3. As a technical guide for calculation of developmentally disabled population service needs. The rationales for each type of service include formulas and other specific criteria which were listed in the state plans.

# LIMITATIONS ON USES OF THE DATA

While this information is presented here as a potential planning resource the user should exercise caution in adopting any of the approaches contained herein:

- o most of the approaches reviewed in this paper are based on slightly different methodologies, policies, assumptions, research and service definitions, some of which were unclear or incomplete, or were not even cited in the state plans. The resulting service needs thus depend to a certain extent on a unique combination of the above factors. Approaches from different state plans (for example, the School Age Education rationale from State A and School Age Training rationale from State B) should not be used together without careful council consideration.
- o this information was originally compiled to provide a national profile of state DD council perceptions and policies on DD service needs, as expressed in the FY 1978 DD state plans. Therefore, the approaches cited here do not form an exhaustive list, and no judgments are made or implied on the validity of these approaches. They merely illustrate choices made by state DD councils.
